Dear Dr. Valcour:

As I promised in my telephone conversation with you on December 19th, I wish to summarize with you the results of my meeting with Father Robert Densmore who recently has undergone evaluation at Saint Luke's Institute. Father Francis Christian, the Chancellor of the Diocese, was also part of that meeting.

It is clear that Father Deasmore is absolutely resistant to the idea of inpatient care at Saint Luke's. While professing to value his priesthood, he is resistant even to the point of being willing to face the possibility of not being assigned rather than participate in Saint Luke's Program. His main stated reason is the he simply could not emotionally handle the atmosphere of suchaa program; e.g., being constantly surrounded by people with many problems, etc. He knows that his physical health condition is precarious and will be seriously jeppardized if he drinks again. He is convinced he has the willpower not to do it, and is willing to live and work under supervision to this end.

While I continue to believe that inpatient care at Saint Luke's would be the best therapeutic approach for Father Densmore, his resistance to the idea and the probable lack of value such a program would have for him as a result makes me reluctant to force it upon him. On the other hand, I am absolutely convinced that Father Densmore does need ongoing therapeutic care. I have therefore offered him the option of meeting with Dr. Henry Ouellette, a psychologist of the Diocesan Clergy and Religious Counseling Center, to work out a plan of ongoing therapy which would be submitted to me for approval. Father Densmore is willing to accept this form of therapy at the present time. I have made it clear to him, however, that even with such approved therapy, if he begins drinking again he <u>must</u> return to Saint Luke's. He indicates that he will be willing to do this under that condition.

While I am not completely comfortable with the above, I feel that it is pastorally the most effective approach for the time being. I am most grateful to you

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and the Staff of Saint Luke's for your assistance in Father Densmore's most difficult case. While you may remove his name from your waiting list at this time, I assure you that should there be any recurrence of his drinking problem and, with the resultant failure of the proposed plan of therapy mentioned above, I will demand his return to Saint Luke's.

Subsequent to our telephone conversation of January 7th, this letter will confirm the fact that Fr. Robert Densmore will be in touch with you shortly to arrange for on-going therapy.

As you know, Father Densmore is returning from in-patient care at St. Luke Institute. St. Luke's has requested that he a) choose a therapist in the Manchester area; b) meet regularly with a spiritual director; c) attend four AA meetings a week; d) work only 30 hours a week for the period of the next six months. Some allegations regarding Father Robert Densmore have recently arisen, to the effect that he molested some extremely young children in the early 1970s. The enclosed memo, I trust, adequately clarifies the situation for you.

Since there is nothing in the previous reports we received from Saint Luke's that would indicate problems in this or other sexual areas, I write to inquire whether or not you feel sexual issues were adequately dealt with during his therapy at Saint Luke's. Father Densmore has indicated to me that he discussed this area of his life in great detail with you during therapy. If that is so, given these new allegations should anything more be required of him? I know that he recently returned to Saint Luke's for what was supposed to be his final after-care workshop. If you feel it wise that he continue to be in touch with you now or at another time, would you please advise me of that fact.

In any case, would you advise me as to whether or not you feel Father Densmore's sexual problems have been adequately dealt with, and whether he is in any danger of acting out in any fashion, assuming he abstains from alcohol.

I would appreciate a response at your earliest convenience in this regard, and thank you in advance for your kind assistance.

Father Bob Densmore provided me with a copy of your questionnaire only shortly before leaving for Washington. I hope my remarks will arrive in time to be of assistance to you.

I have spoken at some length with Bob on two occasions over the last six months. Both of these occasions were the result of allegations raised against him from out of his past. I have shared the extent of those allegations in detail in a letter to Edward Robinson and I would refer you to that letter.

In the course of my conversations with Bob, however, we did discuss his current situation. He was asked to leave his position as Chaplain at the Catholic Medical Center because of some on-going problems with the Director of Pastoral Care. He subsequently has been reassigned as Chaplain at the Elliot Hospital -- a public hospital here in Manchester. He has been functioning in this capacity for the past several months and all the reports that we receive in his regard are quite positive. He himself seems pleased with the work and with his situation in general.

To the best of my knowledge, he continues to be relatively comfortable in his living situation, and gets along well with the people with whom he is living, even though those relationships remain fairly superficial.

In general, I would have to say that I believe Bob is doing fairly well at this stage of his life. He tends to be a very private person and does not have, to the best of my knowledge, any deep, sustaining relationships. These are points of concern. Overall he seems to be handling his life in an adequate manner.

I am responding to your recent inquiry in reference to Father Robert Densmore who is returning for a Continuing Care Workshop. I am pleased to provide you with the following information.

Fr. Densmore currently is serving as chaplain at the Elliot Hospital in Manchester. He is doing his work in a most satisfactory way and everything we hear from the hospital staff is very positive. To the best of my knowledge, he continues to live in sobriety and is attending regular recovery group meetings.

While I have not had regular contact with Fr. Densmore, in talking with the priests with whom he lives and on meeting him occasionally at priests' gatherings, everything indicates that he is doing very well.

Fr. Densmore does not have many close priest friends in the Diocese, and in that regard tends to be a little bit of a loner. He continues to be attentive to his elderly mother, visiting her regularly even though she lives some distance from Manchester. Fr. Densmore's living situation is acceptable although I know he finds some of the household arrangements, such as washing and cooking, somewhat problematic. He seems to be coping in a good fashion, however, with those difficulties.

In summary, I would say that to the best of my knowledge Father Densmore continues in recovery in a good manner, and is performing his ministry in a very satisfactory way. If I can be of any further assistance to you, please do not hesitate to call upon me.

REPORT OF FATHER FRANCIS CHRISTIAN ON FATHER ROBERT DENSMORE

On Monday, September 30th, I met with **Constant of Constant**, New Hampshire. She is a parishioner of Saint Catherine Parish in Charlestown. She indicated that over the years she and her family have been very friendly with Father Densmore. It was out of concern for him and to prevent anyone else being hurt that she felt she needed to report the following facts.

Her son, the son admitted homosexual. He reported to her several months ago that his first homosexual experience occurred at Father Densmore's cottage on Blaisdell Lake. It occurred with a young man named the son, from Boston who, over the years, has been friendly with Father Densmore and visits him regularly. He also reported that on one occasion, approximately two years ago, at the rectory in Charlestown he had a bomosexual experience with Father Densmore. Indicated that for a given period of time a sone of the same the same term as referred to earlier) has been a very

close companion of Father Densmore. He lived at the rectory for a while, and is constantly in evidence. This young man also publicly has stated that he is homosexually involved with Father Densmore. She indicated further that many of the people around the rectory are thought to be homosexuals.

Densmore drinks very heavily on a regular, even daily, basis (Father Paul Sansone, a Franciscan Friar from Rye Beach was in the parish recently, and reported back to the Diocese that he believed Father Densmore to have a serious drinking problem). The second second second second second stated that at least on one occasion he had smoked marijuana at the rectory with Father Densmore.

On October 2nd, I met with Father Densmore. He admitted to the homosexual experience with the second of the also admitted that the second has a tremendous hold over him, which he detests, as he does the things that "forces" him to do. He claimed that he did not believe he was a homosexual, but he certainly was improdent. Father Densmore also admitted that he does drink heavily. He claimes to having 5 or 6 drinks a day, and to the need for alcohol in order to sleep. He denied smoking pot with the but indicated that he had smoked pot in the past. Father Densmore indicated he believed he needed help in these areas. He indicated that he understood that he had compromised his situation in Charlestown, and that it would be necessary for him to resign the parish. He indicated his willingness to be medically evaluated, and to enter the treatment facility if the evaluation showed it would be helpful. He agreed to undergo such an evaluation at Institution in the second of this year.

MEMORANDUM:

RE: Bishop Gendron's Meeting with Father Robert Densmore

Bishop Gendron met at length on December 19th, 1985, with Father Robert Densmore in reference to the report on the recent testing program Father Densmore had undergone at Saint Luke's Institute. That report had indicated that Father Densmore had suffered some serious physical harm from his drinking problem, and had recommended inpatient care at Saint Luke's. At the request of the Bishop Father Christian, the Chancellor who had met with Father Densmore previously and who had arranged for the program, attended a good part of this meeting.

Father Densmore is absolutely unwilling to consider inpatient care at Saint Luke's. He recognizes that he must not drink for health reasons, and is absolutely determined not to drink. He believes that he can do this by himself, and maintained that posture even when the Bishop and Father Christian pointed out to him that the report from Saint Luke's clearly indicated he would not be able to do it alone. Father Densmore indicated a willingness to live and work under supervision, but, again, was adamant about going to Saint Luke's. His main reasons for this position seem to be an unwillingness for the Diocese to spend this much money on him and, more to the point, his belief that the atmosphere at Saint Luke's would drive him crazy. He simply did not believe that living in a community of people with problems would be something he could emotionally stand. Despite repeated attempts on the part of the Bishop and Father Christian to get him to change his mind, he refuses to consider inpatient care at Saint Luke's, even if that means that the Bishop would not reassign him. He professes a love for the priesthood and a desire to serve as a priest, but felt that even with this love he could not accept being forced to go to Saint Luke's.

In the course of the conversation, Father Christian raised the separate issue of Father Densmore's admitted homosexual activity while in Charlestown. Father Christian indicated that this was also a problem that Father Densmore had not come to grips with (Father Densmore had admitted in a previous conversation with Father Christian that he didn't know why he engaged in such activity or why he had let a young man living with him in the rectory "force" him into such behavior when he proclaims to detest it).

Father Christian indicated that it would be difficult for the Bishop to assign Father Densmore unless there was also some guarantee that this problem was being appropriately treated. He indicated that he would receive such treatment at Saint Luke's as part of their wider program. Father Densmore still refused to consider Saint Luke's. The Bishop indicated that he was willing to consider other options to therapy for Father Densmore, but that there would have to be a program of therapy set up that the Bishop approved. Otherwise, there could be no assignment. Father Christian suggested to Father Densmore that he meet with Dr. Ouellette, of the Clergy Counseling Service to discuss what sort of testing and/or therapy Dr. Ouellette would recommend under the circumstances. Father Densmore indicated he would be willing to undergo such testing and any follow-up therapy required. He promised to be in touch with Dr. Ouellette and then to meet with the Bishop again in January, to see if such a suggested program would be acceptable to the Bishop. The Bishop made it clear, and Father Densmore agreed to this point, that if Father Densmore were to begin drinking agin the Bishop would require him to return to Saint Luke's for inpatient care. In other words, Father Densmore agreed that any lapse in sobriety would prove a need for inpatient care.

Father Densmore has volunteered to pay for the cost of the counseling involved, even though he recognizes that this is a kind of admission of guilt, but he also understands that not to pay would be a denial of guilt which would not readily accept.

I told Father Densmore that I was uncomfortable with the fact that there was nothing in the reports from St. Luke's which indicate that any issues of sexual acting out had been sufficiently dealt with during his therapy. Father Densmore assured me that St. Luke's had been most thorough in this regard, and that he had discussed these problems completely with Edward Robinson, his primary therapist. I suggested to Father Densmore that I felt it important to write to St. Luke's with all this information, to be sure that there was nothing more they wanted him to do. He was agreeable to this suggestion.

I am currently not sure of whether Father Densmore is telling me the truth in these areas, although I am not sure of what he would gain by denying them. He knows his situation in the Diocese is precarious, and he sincerely seems to have made good progress in contolling his drinking. He appears moderately happy and successful in his hospital chaplaincy work, and he seems to understand that he can never go back to a parish ministry. If the sexual issues are unclear or unresolved, however, then certainly they need further evaluation and attention. Thank you for coming to meet with me on February 23rd. It is certainly very important for the Diocese to be aware of any and all cases of clergy misbehavior, and it is urgent that we be aware of situations involving child abuse. I am most grateful to you, as a result, for bringing to my attention the situation you described regarding Father Robert Densmore's involvement with you and your brother in the early 1970s. I would like to share with you what I have done in response to our meeting.

First of all, I met at some length with Father Densmore. As I shared with you during our conversations, it is important for a priest who has had a problem in the past to not forget what has happened. Being reminded of the pain he has caused is a reinforcement to assist him to not repeat the same sort of behavior. As you know, when the Diocese first became aware of Father Densmore's drinking and sexual addictions, he was required to go into inpatient therapy at Saint Luke's Institute for a period of approximately eight months, where he dealt extensively with these problems. In my recent conversation with Father Densmore he repeatedly reiterated how that therapy and the follow-up therapy he has been required to undergo has been extremely helpful to him and enabled him to live soberly and chastely. He obviously is saddened by whatever pain he has caused you. He sincerely hopes that the therapy you have been undergoing will continue to be helpful to you, and while he cannot turn back the clock he recognizes his responsibiliity and sincerely wishes and prays for your forgiveness and your recovery. I strongly reminded Father Densmore of the conditions under which he is allowed to do any priestly ministry in the Diocese, i.e., that he will never again function in parish ministry, and at the recommendation of Saint Luke's Institute can be allowed to work in hospital or institutional ministry only as long as he does not drink and/or fall back into previous patterns of behavior. He clearly knows that any repetition of that behavior will lead to his loss of the right to function as appriest.

As a result of our meeting I also have been in contact with the therapy team at Saint Luke's Institute which treated Father Densmore during his stay there and continues to monitor him in after care. They, of course, are aware of his previous addictive problems but are grateful to be able to continually confront him with those problems and thereby encourage his sobriety and his sexual control.

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As I stated to you during our meeting, you undoubtedly deserve reimbursement for your counseling expenses. That reimbursement will be made in full, according to the charges you shared with me. Father Densmore has agreed to pay these charges by reimbursing the Diocese in an appropriate sum monthly until the charges are paid off. As I shared with you, it is normal in instances of such compensation to an injured party that the party acknowledge the reception of such compensation and appropriately release the party paying the damages from future liability in regard to the facts for which compensation is being made. I enclose a sample release form in this regard for your consideration. We can certainly discuss the wording if you have any problems with it.

In closing, may I again thank you for the fact that you have approached the Diocese in this regard. I know that your pain and personal injury has been a difficult burden to carry, and I am grateful that it has not prevented you from doing everything you have done to both help yourself and make sure that Father Densmore cannot harm any other child.

I will await word from you to perhaps set up another meeting to discuss the next step in this process.
